President Lucas called the meeting to order at 10:49 a.m. The secretary called the roll and reported that nine (9) board members were present.

This meeting was live-streamed on RTA's Facebook page (www.facebook.com/rideRTA) for staff and members of the public. Based on Centers for Disease Control guidance to continue to avoid large events and gatherings and Ohio Department of Public Health advice that businesses may continue to require mitigation measures, as well as RTA's interest in protecting community and employee health and safety, several measures were put in place for in-person attendance, which are spelled out on the meeting notice. The public was allowed to attend the meeting in-person.

The Secretary advised that notice of this meeting have been posted more than twenty-four hours in advance of the meeting, that the usual notification has been given the news media and other interested persons, and that all requirements of the Ohio Revised Code and Rules and Bylaws of this Board regarding notice of meeting have been complied with.

Minutes

President Lucas stated that the minutes from the July 27, 2021 Board meeting had been previously distributed and reviewed, and asked whether there were any additions and/or corrections. There were no corrections. It was moved and seconded. The minutes were approved.

Public Comments - Agenda Items (comments were submitted in-person and by phone)

- 1. <u>Larry Rodriquez</u> He is a part of NOBLE. The NextGen changes are affecting the riders. They feel like there was not an open discussion and not enough public comments.
- Mrs. Gardner Called in to complain about the changes to the 15A and 48A service under NextGen. She requested the routes be put back in service.
- 3. Ms. Montgomery Called about reinstating the 15A. There was no discussion about this route or 48A. The previous route allows a limited walk. Ms. Birdsong said they will evaluate these routes to make sure proper discussion happens.
- 4. Claudette Candy Called about keeping the 15A and 48A as stated previously.
- 5. <u>Mr. Watson</u> Called to request the 15A and 48A be reinstated. These routes serve the communities better than the NextGen changes.
- 6. <u>Juanita Harrison</u> Called about reinstating the 15A and 48A. Seniors need these buses. People who don't have cars need to get around.

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- 7. Airric Stewart Called about reinstating the 15A and 48A. There was a proposal made at the July 1 meeting at the Lee-Harvard Community Center that was unanimously accepted to put these routes back in place with the adjustments he recommended in an email to the Board and executive staff. There should be a timely response to the public about the adjustments. Ms. Walker-Minor said they are working internally and will come to a decision on the comments.
- 8. <u>Hayes Rowan</u> He called about the negative effects of buses idling and RTA public records request process. He asked for these items to be put on the next agenda and asked that his email be sent to the Board.

Committee Reports

There were no reports.

Community Advisory Committee (CAC)

Ms. Duarte said community engage is critical in shaping the RTA. If we want to be an effective transit system, we need to understand what the community values and how we can serve them. She knows what issues come up from her perspective. Overall, she loves riding the RTA. It is fairly reliable and gets her to most places she needs to go. Some riders may have different experiences and feel different. She wants to ensure RTA is acknowledging this and crafting plans on improvements. We need to do a better job at engaging with the community with what platform the community uses most frequently. For ages 18 years and under it may be best reached digitally. She buys her tickets on her phone. She'd like a code sent to her phone and for it to last for an hour. Younger riders might be inclined to answer questions about the bus ride whether it was on-time, clean and safe similar to what Uber and the scooter companies are doing to quantify this information. Face to face outreach is good. Make comment boxes more available. Ensure the language is translated.

Other concerns she's heard was service availability and on time issues. Someone who couldn't get to a cleaning job was picked up by the client. This is not always possible. People who have been systematically excluded depend on RTA. She's connected with local partners. She's looking to connect with internal staff and interns. She wants to highlight their experiences. She appreciates having this platform to reinforce how important equitable and fair community engagement is. A lot of times community engagement is the last ingredient but it should be our priority. She wants ideas to make improvements.

Ad Hoc Committee Reports

President Lucas thanked Mr. Davidson and his staff for organizing the call-in center. There was a system break down this Sunday and calls were reorganized. He met with STC about ensuring wheelchairs are not put in the back of the vehicle since that makes the ride bumpy.

Ms. Moss said a lot of these issues have gone through committee. There was a thorough presentation on this item. Most of the insurance was in place prior to this vote.

- F. 2021-82 Authorizing Contract No. 2021-070 with Direct Energy Business Marketing, LLC dba Direct Energy Business for furnishing the Authority's full requirements of Natural Gas Supply for a period of three years at a projected amount NTE \$5,400,000.00 with two, one-year options at a projected amount NTE \$1,800,000.00 per option year, for a projected total contract amount NTE \$9,000,000.00 for the five-year period (General Fund, Accounting Department budget), the adoption of which was moved by Mayor Byrne, seconded by Chief McCall and approved by unanimous vote.

Secretary-Treasurer's Report

Kay Sutula, Director of OMB presented the report in the absence of Rajan Gautam, Deputy General Manager of Finance and Secretary-Treasurer. In June 2021, the U.S. unemployment rate rose from 5.8% to 5.9%. In July it dropped to 5.4%. Ohio's unemployment rate rose in June from 5.0% to 5.2%. The rate for July rose from 5.2% to 5.4% and is now even with the U.S. The Cuyahoga County rate rose in June from 5.7% to 7.1%. We do not have the rate yet for July. President Biden extended mask wearing on public transportation to Jan 18, 2022. The recovery will be a long haul. The preventive measures implemented will go into 2022 and beyond.

Ridership has remained steady from May-July. July ridership increased by 5.4% compared to 2020. YTD ridership is 21.8% below 2020 levels. Passenger fare revenue has remained steady over the last three months about \$1.7 million per month. Total passenger fares in July is 5.7% lower than 2020. YTD total passenger fares are 21.3% lower than 2020. Sales tax August receipts show May activity. August was 22.8% higher than August 2020. YTD it is 13.3% higher than 2020. The 3rd stimulus checks were delivered to U.S. citizens in March 2021 for \$1,400. We are seeing the effects of that. President Lucas asked what the variances of not collecting fare by using the replacement bus service on the Blue/Green Line. Dr. Caver said the replaced bus service fare is free when there is a shutdown, but the ridership has decreased 30%.

General Manager/CEO Report

India Birdsong, General Manager/CEO, presented the report. The federal government extended the mask mandate through Jan 18, 2022. We will update material for the riding public. Two Transit Police were promoted to sergeants. They were sworn in on August 8. Chief Jones officiated the ceremony in the Board Room to celebrate the work and achievements of TP officers. RTA partnered with Tri-C in a Workforce Success Program. The completion of the program was held in the Board Room. Tri-C was in attendance to recognize four RTA employees and a full tuition scholarship for Darcía Whitaker. Elevating Women Together (EWT) has the mission of supporting the advancement

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of women and their professional development. Nicole Richmond, Paratransit Operator won a lunch with the GM, CEO. They discussed career opportunities. She was a graduate of the Tri-C program.

Ann August, a national transit leader who served in various roles in APTA and as the former Executive Director of Birmingham-Jefferson County Transit Authority passed away from COVID August 22, 2021. She was recognized by COMTO as one of the Women Who Move the Nation. She's had a 35-year career in public transportation. Chief McCall added that Ann's passing was a surprise. This will affect the entire APTA family. She had a distinguished career in the military as well. She was active as a CEO at APTA at a time when we could count on one hand the number of female CEOs. When Chief McCall was the Chair of APTA, she reached out to Ann about reorganizing APTA and she was up to the task.

President's Report

President Lucas thanked the staff for their support. The job of president is more than preceding at meetings. Mayor Koomar asked what the CEO's signing authority was prior to the change order for Resolution 2021-83. Melinda said it was \$250,000.

Public Comments - Non-Agenda Items (comments were submitted in-person and phone)

- 1. Loh She welcomed Ms. Duarte. She misses George Zeller. He spoke about the economy regularly at RTA Board Meetings. She is happy to be back in person. She wants the live stream to continue and to accept comments through the phone and email. Community engagement is important. W. 25 still has problems on the weekend and nights. NextGen went fast. She still wants the E-Line trolley. This helps tourism. The #14 was cut from Buckeye area so homeless can move into permanent housing in that area because they can't get to work. The NextGen schedule leaves people stranded who work 2nd and 3rd shift. We need revenue.
- 2. Carlitta Gardner Called to ask that the 15A and 48A be reinstated.
- 3. Arric Stewart People were left on hold for a long time during the beginning of the meeting during the executive session that callers were lost. One of the callers attended the July 1 Lee Harvard Committee meeting including Councilman Joe Jones. The community in Ward 1 wants the #48A to have 15 buses each way, 7-days of week, running one hour intervals. For the 15A they want it to run every 20 minutes each hour and 7-day a week service in two hour or one hour intervals. He is waiting for a meeting with the Secretary-Treasurer to discuss the capital bonds with Ward 1.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Authority to enter into a contract for Project 19.10 On-Call Bridge Engineering Services II for a period of 24 months.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: This project is to obtain professional services to perform bridge engineering support. The services will be authorized by task order on an as needed basis.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The Request for Proposals ("RFP") was posted on the GCRTA Procurement web site and advertised in the local newspapers. Thirty-eight interested parties, including potential subcontractors, downloaded the solicitation package. These services were solicited through a competitive negotiated procurement, utilizing the Brooks Act Procedures. Under this process, the Authority's evaluation panel first selects the most technically qualified firm, solicits a pricing proposal from that firm, and negotiates price only with that firm. Should the Authority determine that an agreement could not be reached with the most qualified firm, it may reject that proposal and repeat the process with the next most qualified firm. In this instance, negotiations were held with The Osborn Engineering Company the first ranked firm, and an acceptable price was reached.

The Osborn Engineering Company has successfully completed projects for the Cleveland State University, the City of Akron, NASA, and ODOT, among others.

The Procurement Department performed a price analysis and determined the proposed pricing to be fair and reasonable to the Authority.

- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: All Affirmative Action requirements have been met. Osborn Engineering has committed to achieve the 4% DBE participation goal established for this procurement, which is equivalent to \$12,000.00, and has agreed to utilize the following certified DBE firms: Denise's Flagging (Female-owned), American Roadway Logistics (Female-owned), Barr Engineering (Asian-owned), Lawhon & Associates (Female-owned), and Somat (Asian-owned) in amounts that will be a function of the specific nature of the on-call service required.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: Does not apply.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: This contract shall be payable from the RTA Capital and/or RTA Development Funds, Engineering & Project Development Department budget, including but not limited to 100% local funds and FTA grant funds to be determined, in an amount not to exceed \$300,000.00 for a period of 24 months. This is the budgeted amount for this project.
- 7.0 ALTERNATIVES: Reject this offer. Rejection of this offer will create undue hardship on GCRTA's Engineering staff due to their existing workload and prevent access to external technical expertise when needed.

- 8.0 RECOMMENDATION: This procurement was discussed by the Board of Trustees at the September 14, 2021 Operational Planning and Infrastructure Committee meeting. It is recommended that the offer from The Osborn Engineering Company be accepted and the resolution passed authorizing the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer to enter into a contract.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This action will allow the Authority to enter into a sole source contract to provide rail switch heater equipment, hardware, components, software, and related services for GCRTA's Light Rail Line (Blue, Green, and Trunk).
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: On January 16, 2018, the Board of Trustees approved Resolution No. 2018-2 authorizing Contract No. 2017-102 for the purchase of Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) replacement services to Kapsch TrafficCom USA Inc. ("Kapsch"). DYNAC by Kapsch is GCRTA's newly installed Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system. SCADA is utilized for train control and monitoring, as well as numerous other communications related systems. This action will allow the Authority to fully integrate the SCADA traffic and communication management system into the Authority's transportation and facilities management applications and to implement the rail switch heater program for GCRTA's Light Rail Line (Blue, Green, and Trunk). The rail switch heaters provided by Kapsch will link directly to the SCADA system, allowing the devices to be monitored on a 24-hour basis. Each rail switch heater will have a control point that allows Power & Way maintainers and dispatchers to remotely monitor the voltage and amperage draw of the heating element to determine the health of the component. This will allow confirmation that the rail switch heater is functioning properly without the need for visual field inspection of each unit. Furthermore, for the program, DYNAC CCTV cameras will be included to allow the operator of the system to check the status of each rail switch heater from a remote location. This aspect will limit the need to send Track or Signal Department crews to the scene to inspect the units. It will also streamline the system by limiting unnecessary trouble calls to the area due to the monitoring capabilities.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: The sole source contract is exempt from competitive bidding as authorized by Section 306.43(H)(6) of the Ohio Revised Code. A pilot program was approved in August, 2020 for Moreland Pocket on GCRTA's Green Line. It was determined that the rail switch heater equipment must include proprietary components and software from Kapsch in order for the DYNAC system to operate as designed. Kapsch is the only vendor that can provide these proprietary rail switch heater components, software, project management, engineering, applications programming, field service and labor, testing, training, support, and other services.

A cost analysis has been performed and the Procurement Department has determined the negotiated proposal from Kapsch is fair and reasonable to the Authority.

1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This Intergovernmental Agreement will allow a volume discount to the Cleveland Metropolitan School District ("CMSD"), the Authority's largest volume buyer of student fare cards and tickets, for the purchase and payment of student tickets for the 2021-2022 school year. The purchase and payment will relieve some of the budgetary impact on the schools, as well as improve cash flow and accounts receivable activity for the GCRTA. This action includes ratification of the issuance of two hundred twenty thousand (220,000) 2-trip tickets to CMSD for use by students on August 6, 2021.

The CMSD school board approved this agreement at its August 24, 2021 board meeting.

- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The proposed Intergovernmental Agreement with CMSD will allow for discounted rates, provided the school district meets certain criteria. This proposal is a result of discussions with CMSD with uncertainties presented by the COVID-19 pandemic in which CMSD remains uncertain of how the school year will progress between in-school or remote learning for its students. The terms have been modified from prior years.
- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 4.0 DBE/AFFIRMATIVE ACTION BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: This action is consistent with the Board's policy to authorize the Authority to enter into intergovernmental agreements with school districts for student fares. Authorization of this Intergovernmental Agreement will allow GCRTA to continue to provide economical public transportation to students as well as promote ridership of public transportation.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: Based on the needs of CMSD, a maximum of 2,400,000 2-trip tickets could be purchased which would result in revenue of up to \$3,840,000 for the Authority.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL STUDENT TRANSPORTATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE GREATER CLEVELAND REGIONAL TRANSIT AUTHORITY AND THE CLEVELAND METROPOLITAN SCHOOL DISTRICT

FOR THE 2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR

THIS AGREEMENT, by and between the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority (hereinafter referred to as "GCRTA"), 1240 West 6th Street, Cleveland, Ohio 44113-1331, acting pursuant to Resolution No. _____, adopted by its Board of Trustees on September ______, 2021, and the Cleveland Metropolitan School District (hereinafter referred to as the "District"), whose principle offices are located at 1111 Superior Ave E, Suite 1800, Cleveland, OH 44114, acting pursuant to Resolution No. 2021-81009(B), adopted by the Board of Education of the District on August 24, 2021.

WITNESSETH: That

WHEREAS, the District is certified by the Ohio Department of Education to provide education services; and

WHEREAS, the District wishes to make transportation available to its enrolled students and to students on whose behalf it is obligated to provide transportation service; and

WHEREAS, the GCRTA is amenable to providing said service to the District's students; and

WHEREAS, the District and GCRTA wish to provide transportation in a controlled, efficient and cost effective manner; and

WHEREAS, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the District moved to remote learning in March 2020 and its students did not use GCRTA's transportation services from that date through the June 19, 2020 conclusion of the term of the Intergovernmental Student Transportation Agreement between the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority and the Cleveland Metropolitan School district for Academic Year 2019 ("2019 Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the District requested a refund for a portion of the amount paid under the 2019 Agreement to reflect the time period during which it did not take advantage of the transportation services provided by GCRTA; and

WHEREAS, although GCRTA continued to provide transportation services during the time period from March 2020 through June 2020, it wishes to support its community partners to the extent practicable; and

WHEREAS, after negotiation, the District and GCRTA agreed that GCRTA would apply a credit of \$518,000 to the District's account over the course of the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years, with 25% of that amount credited to each of the fall 2020, spring 2021, fall 2021 and spring 2022 terms; and

WHEREAS, If the value of the tickets purchased by the District in any term is less than the amount of the credit for that term, GCRTA will credit up to the amount of the tickets purchased and carry the remainder forward to the next term but not past the spring 2022 term; and

WHEREAS, GCRTA will not in any event issue a cash refund; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic created uncertainty regarding whether the District's students would attend school in person or virtually during the 2020-2021 school year as well as the need for transportation services and GCRTA and the District entered into a short-term agreement to address the District's reduced need for transportation during the COVID-19 pandemic without setting a precedent for future agreements; and

WHEREAS, due to continuing uncertainty for the 2021-2022 school year, the District has determined that tickets will best address the District's need for transportation during the 2021-2022 school year.

NOW, THEREFORE, GCRTA and the District, for good and valuable consideration including the mutual promises contained below, agree as follows:

1. TERM OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall commence on August 1, 2021, and shall continue through June 22, 2022.

2. PRICE AND TERMS OF SALE

- a) The District will purchase up to 2,400,000 two-trip student tickets at a price of \$1.60 per two-trip ticket. (These tickets will be referred to herein as "Tickets.") Tickets must be ordered on a separate written purchase order. The District shall not assess a charge in excess of this price for each Ticket. GCRTA shall deliver the number of Tickets specified in each order to the District's Transportation Department. The risk of loss for said Tickets shall pass to the District immediately upon delivery of the Tickets to the District. The District shall sign the accompanying invoice and immediately return the signed invoice to GCRTA's Accounts Receivable Department.
- b) Tickets may be used by District students in Grades 6 through 12, residing within the borders of Cuyahoga County and attending private or public schools certified by Ohio Department of Education until the expiration date of the

Tickets. The District may exchange unused tickets prior to such expiration date. Tickets may be used on regular routes operated by the GCRTA for the purpose of transporting fare paying passengers. Tickets are non-transferable. Non-students using Tickets will either be denied service or required to pay the full fare.

c) Payment

GCRTA shall invoice the District for each order of Tickets and the District shall remit payment within 30 days of receipt of the invoice.

Failure to make timely payment may lead to the termination of this agreement.

Due to the fact that the District's students did not use transportation services during a portion of the 2019-2020 school year, GCRTA and the District agreed that GCRTA would apply a credit to the District's account. GCRTA will apply the remaining credit to the District's account over the course of the 2021-2022 school year. In no event will the remainder be carried forward past the 2021-2022 school year. Cash refunds will not be issued.

d) invoices

Invoices will be directed to the District's Office of Accounting, Attention: Michael Bowen, Director of Accounting.

3. RIGHT TO TERMINATE AGREEMENT

If either Party becomes insolvent or fails to perform any undertaking essential to the purpose of this Agreement, or fails to conduct its business to the satisfaction of the other Party, then the other Party may cancel and terminate this Agreement by thirty (30) days' notice in writing to the defaulting Party, provided, however, that the defaulting Party may cure any failure of performance within thirty days of receipt of notice.

The expiration or termination, for any reason, of this Agreement shall be without prejudice to the rights of either Party.

4. STUDENT CONDUCT

a) In accordance with its representations in 2015, the District removed the following language from the 2016-2017 Student Code of Conduct and maintains its deletion from the 2021-2022 Student Code of Conduct:

A student suspended from the bus will be given two RTA tickets at the time of suspension. Additional RTA tickets will be provided, as needed, each day the student appears in school during the term of the bus suspension.

b) The Board of Education of the District has adopted and maintains the policy outlined in Exhibit A hereto.

5. FORCE MAJEURE

If because of Force Majeure, either Party shall be unable to carry out any of its obligations under this Agreement, then those obligations shall be suspended to the extent made necessary by Force Majeure. The Party affected by Force Majeure shall give notice to the other Party as promptly as practical of the nature and probable duration of such Force Majeure. "Force Majeure" shall mean acts of God, riots, strikes, labor disputes, labor or material shortages, fires, explosions, floods, breakdowns of or damage to plants, equipment or facilities, or other causes of similar nature which are beyond the reasonable control of the Party and which wholly or partially prevent the timely performance of the Party's obligations under this Agreement, provided that the effect of such Force Majeure shall be eliminated insofar as possible with all reasonable dispatch; provided further, that performance of service obligations by the Party shall be excused only to the extent made necessary by the Force Majeure condition; provided further, that neither Party shall be required to settle a labor dispute on terms unacceptable to the Party affected: and provided further, that neither Party shall be required to rebuild all or a major portion of its facilities which are destroyed or substantially impaired by a Force Majeure condition. The Parties agree that, during the duration of the Force Majeure condition, neither will seek to declare the other in default for failure to timely perform its obligations under this Agreement.

6. RECORDS AND AUDITS

The District shall maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence directly pertinent to the performance of the Work under this Agreement in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and practices consistently applied and Federal Acquisition Regulations, Parts 30 and 31, as applicable. GCRTA and its authorized representatives shall have the right to audit, to examine and to make copies of or extracts from all financial and related records (in whatever form they may be kept, whether written, electronic, or other) relating to or pertaining to this Agreement kept by or under the control of the District, including, but not limited to those kept by the District, its employees, agents, assigns, successors and subcontractors. Such records shall include, but not be limited to, accounting records, written policies and procedures; subcontract files; all paid vouchers including those for out-of-pocket expenses; other reimbursement supported by invoices; ledgers; cancelled checks; deposit slips; bank statements; journals; original estimates; estimating work sheets; contract amendments and change order files; back charge logs and supporting documentation; insurance documents; payroll documents; timesheets; memoranda; and correspondence. The District

shall, at all times during the term of this Agreement and for a period of three years after the completion of this Agreement, maintain such records, together with such supporting or underlying documents and materials. The District shall at any time requested by GCRTA, whether during or after completion of this Agreement, and at the District's own expense make such records available for inspection and audit (including copies and extracts of records as required) by GCRTA. Such records shall be made available to GCRTA during normal business hours at the District's office or place of business. In the event that no such location is available, then the financial records, together with the supporting or underlying documents and records, shall be made available for audit at a time and location that is convenient for GCRTA. The District shall ensure GCRTA has these rights with the District's employees, agents, assigns, successors, and subcontractors, and the obligations of these rights shall be explicitly included in any subcontracts or agreements formed between the District and any subcontractors to the extent that those subcontracts or agreements relate to fulfillment of the District's obligations to GCRTA. If the audit discovers substantive findings related to fraud, misrepresentation, or non-performance, GCRTA may recoup the costs of the audit work from the District. Any adjustments and/or payments that must be made as a result of any such audit or inspection of the District's invoices and/or records shall be made within a reasonable amount of time (not to exceed 90 days) from presentation of GCRTA's findings to the District.

7. ASSIGNMENT

Neither Party shall assign any of its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Party.

8. CHANGES; ALTERATIONS

No change, alteration, modification, or addition to this Agreement shall be effective unless in writing and properly executed by both Parties.

9. APPLICABLE LAW; SEVERABILITY

This Agreement and any disputes relating to it shall be construed under the laws of the State of Ohio. If any provisions of this Agreement are determined to be invalid or unenforceable, such invalidity or unenforceability shall not affect any of the Agreement's remaining provisions.

10. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This instrument constitutes the entire Agreement of the Parties with respect to its subject matter, superseding all prior understandings, agreements, or communications (whether oral or written), and shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties, their successors, and permitted assigns.

11. NOTICES

All notices to be given pursuant to this Agreement shall be sufficient if given in writing, delivered in person or by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, and, in either case addressed to the respective party at its postal address or at such other address or addresses each may hereafter designate in writing. Notices by mail shall be deemed effective and complete at the time of posting and mailing in accordance herewith.

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Exhibit A Repeat Violent Offender Exclusion Policy

Any high school student found by any judicial system to have committed two or more nonviolent crimes (including, but not limited to, theft, criminal damaging, disorderly conduct, or menacing) related to conduct occurring on an RTA vehicle or at an RTA facility or stop may, at the discretion of the CEO or his/her designee, forfeit their privilege to receive RTA transportation or payment for a period of up to one year.

Any high school student found by a judicial system to have committed any violent crime (including, but not limited to, assault, robbery, any sex crime, arson, possession of a dangerous ordinance, or possession of any weapon prohibited by Cleveland Codified Ordinance Section 627.11) related to conduct occurring on an RTA vehicle or at an RTA facility or stop will forfeit their privilege to receive RTA transportation or payment for a period of one year.

Any high school student found by a judicial system to have committed any violent or nonviolent crime related to conduct occurring on an RTA vehicle or at an RTA facility or stop after a one year forfeiture and reinstatement of RTA transportation privileges will permanently forfeit his or her privilege to receive RTA transportation or payment.

Students who forfeit their RTA transportation privilege pursuant to this policy will not be provided any other means of transportation by the District, except that students who require transportation services pursuant to an individualized education program or 504 plan will be provided alternative transportation services by the District.

WHEREAS, the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("GCRTA" or "the Authority") provides public transportation that facilitates travel by students to and from school; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 2006-131, to avoid an undue hardship on the school districts and to improve the cash flow for the Authority, the GCRTA established an alternate fare structure for the 2006–2007 school year through the 2009–2010 school year for school districts that purchase \$1,000,000 or more of student fare cards per year; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 2010-019 the rates of fares to be charged by the GCRTA were amended; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution No. 2010-043, the alternate fare structure established in Resolution No. 2006-131 was revised for the 2010–2011 school year through the 2012–2013 school year to align with the fares enacted in Resolution 2010-019; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 2012-076, the Board of Trustees approved an agreement with the Cleveland Metropolitan School District ("CMSD"), the Authority's largest volume buyer of student fare cards, for the purchase of \$2,430,000 in tickets in advance and instituted the use of farebox-compatible picture identification cards ("Passes") thus improving transportation efficiency and control of student passengers; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution Nos. 2013-109, 2014-061, 2015-075, 2016-066, 2017-051, 2018-073 and 2019-101, the Board of Trustees approved agreements with CMSD for the purchase of passes and tickets; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 2016-036, the rates of fares to be charged by the GCRTA were amended, including an increase in the price of a student ticket from \$1.50 to \$1.75; and

WHEREAS, due to the uncertainties presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, GCRTA entered into a modified agreement with CMSD for the 2020-2021 school year with terms that were modified from previous years; and

WHEREAS, due to the ongoing uncertainties presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, it is in the best interest of the Authority to again enter into an intergovernmental agreement with CMSD with terms that have been modified from previous years for the 2021-2022 school year; and

WHEREAS, CMSD has agreed to purchase up to 2,400,000 two-trip student tickets at a price of \$1.60 per two-trip ticket, and to order tickets as needed; and

WHEREAS, CMSD has ordered and GCRTA has delivered 220,000 tickets to CMSD for use by students.

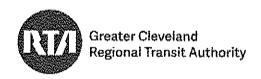
