The meeting was called to order at 9:06 a.m. There were eight (8) Board members present. Rev. Lucas arrived after the roll call.

It was advised that notice of this meeting had been posted more than twenty-four hours in advance of the meeting, that the usual notification had been given the news media and other interested persons, and that all requirements of the Ohio Revised Code and Rules and Bylaws of this Board regarding notice of meeting had been complied with.

Minutes

The minutes from the January 21, 2025, Board Meeting had been previously distributed and reviewed, and the Board Chair asked whether there were any additions and/or corrections. There were no corrections. It was moved and seconded. The minutes were approved.

Public Comments - Agenda and Non-Agenda Items

The public comment section has been consolidated to include agenda and non-agenda items.

- Alec Alec lives in the Westpark area and takes the RedLine from Triskett to Quincy for work.
 RTA's meeting time is not conducive to the public's ability to attend the board meetings.
 Evenings would be a better time. Alec notices a lot of unhoused people in the station. If RTA grew its ridership and assisted the unhoused it would improve perceived safety.
- 2. <u>Keven Hinkle Cleveland, OH</u> snow drifts affect customers getting on the vehicles. Operators need to assist customers with wayfinding questions.
- 3. <u>Chris Martin Cleveland, OH</u> Chris thanked RTA for putting bus lanes into the design for the W. 25 BRT. Chris asked for the cost to pay for Chief Jones to attend the Presidential Inauguration. Chris is concerned about the rise of fascism. RTA should not participate in immigration enforcement.
- 4. Airric Stewart Cleveland, OH Airric said the customer service line is still not working correctly. The line should address what customers are calling about, not just paratransit. Mayor Koomar added that the line is working as designed. Airric suggested both public comment sessions should be included. No evidence has been provided to the public that his proposals for 15A and 48A are not substantiated. Mayor Koomar said they have looked at NextGen and it is attracting ridership to key areas such as hospitals, schools, etc. Ms. Terry

agreed with Mayor Koomar. The survey is working as attended. NextGen service will continue as designed. Any disrespect from the public will result in limited time to speak. Public input will be received and reviewed.

(Webform comment)

Paul Koomar stated that my route suggestions for the 15A and 48A took away service from the key points of focus—work, school, and hospitals. There is no evidence of Koomar's statement that lines up with the truth. If he has an example that he believes to be evidence of his statement provided I want this email and the next 2 to be read out loud to the public at the February 25th Board of Trustees meeting. The public was never given a clear opportunity to study the suggestions that were provided. This was not done prior to the development period of NextGen. It was not done during the initial implementation. The agency has repeatedly misrepresented the facts of my suggestions. They should be made available through the webform in the exact way they are conveyed by me. The email, subject line, "Touchpoints for the 15A". The email, "Transfers points for the 15A and 48A" state openly in specific, direct language if you have you have evidence that these route suggestions are flawed for the pursuit of work, school, and hospital. Theresa Burrage has been sent these emails again on Monday, February 24. Post my phone number on this webform.

- 5. <u>LaQueta Worley Cleveland, OH</u> (webform) Are the board members seriously transit riders? Which routes are they knowledgeable about? How did they find out the routes? Describe to us their experiences of first learning how to ride (which city or town, which routes did you have to learn)? Have you ever had to teach a child? How have the routes and fares changed?
- 6. <u>Bernie Oakar Medina</u> (webform) We need through service returned from Strongsville to the West Side market. Need to return some service to Bridge Avenue.
- 7. <u>Isaac Shimsky-Agosto</u> Cleveland, OH (webform) Now that the new validators have been installed across the RTA system, I am hoping that the long promised smart cards will finally be put into use. While EZPass has certainly made using RTA far easier, I am looking forward to the convenience of having a card. A card that can just be pulled out and used, is more convenient than something that requires a login and charged battery.
- 8. <u>Harley Rubin Cleveland Hts</u>. (webform) I really want to eliminate stripes on the windows of buses and bus wraps. I take the bus to work every day and the darkness of these buses impacts my own mental health in the winter, and my ability to see what stop I'm at. It wouldn't be a stretch to say this is an ableist part of the bus system, and I hope you take the importance of bus patrons versus advertising money very seriously.

Harley added on the phone that the Board should meet at a better time. It's a safety issue for the unhoused to sleep in the stations.

adoption of which was moved by Mr. Sleasman, seconded by Ms. Elder. There was a roll call. There were eight (8) and one abstention from Mayor Weiss. It passed.

Secretary-Treasurer's Report

Rajan D. Gautam, Deputy General Manager of Finance and Secretary-Treasurer gave the report. The annual inflation rate back in June 2022 had gone to 9.1%, went down to 2.4% and had a slight uptick to 3% in January 2025. The FOMC has maintained rates at 4.5% effective January 29. They are scheduled to meet again March 18-19 which will determine any resulting changes.

Ridership through January 2025 compared to pre COVID levels is approximately 600,000 rides lower or roughly 24%. The January 2025 ridership compared to January 2024 was 4.3% higher. Passenger fares for January 2025 were 31.4% below January 2024 largely due to the timing of revenue collections. It should catch up over the next few months. As a result, it was 31.2% below budget. Sales and use tax for February based on November 2024 activity was 2% lower than 2024.

Ms. Pacetti asked about the fare revenue decline from 2024. Mr. Gautam said the numbers are on a cash basis and are based on timing. Mayor Weiss asked if the sales tax decline is a issue. Mr. Gautam said that March collections that are based on December economic activity will act as a key to determine patterns. Also the discussion of increased inflation and international tariffs will also be somewhat incorporated into the March collections.

General Manager, CEO Report

India L. Birdsong Terry, General Manager, CEO gave the report. Transit Equity Day was held on February 4. It is a National Day of Action held on Rosa Parks' Birthday to elevate the message that public transit should be safe, sustainable and equitable for all people. Ohio Public Transit Association / Ohio Loves Transit Day was February 11 in Columbus, Ohio. Several staff members attended engagement meetings. Ms. Terry testified at the Ohio House Transportation Committee, February 11 to advocate for increased transit funding.

Staff attended an Executive Leadership Retreat, January 30-31 at Corporate College East. Facilitator Mike Nwankwo led the team through discussions and exercises covering RTA's Mission, Vision and the book TRACTION by Gino Wickman. RTA held a celebratory event in recognition of its 50th anniversary at a CAVS game, February 11. Nearly 300 employees attended the event. Ms. Terry moderated a APTA podcast on workforce development and mentorship. It aired January 30. Several guests from the transit industry were guest panelists. Ms. Terry was a judge for Accelerate 2025. She is also on the Board. Accelerate is where change agents and ideas converge to improve Cleveland. Individuals across Greater Cleveland have the chance to pitch ideas and win seed money to help launch their idea to make the region a better place

Ms. Terry was honored along with other women for the CAV's Black Heritage Celebration, February 21. Staff attended the National Association of Black Journalists – Cleveland Chapter, February 21 at their Hall of Fame Induction and Awards Ceremony.

President's Report

Mayor Koomar thanked Mayor Biasiotta for his service. He asked the Board and staff to wish Rev. Lucas a happy birthday. Theresa Burrage, Board Support will be leaving the RTA for a new position. Ms. Terry thanked her for her time supporting the Board and RTA. A celebration will be held on her last meeting, Tuesday, March 4. A Board Retreat is scheduled this week. Rev. Lucas thanked the staff for their calls and concerns when he was not feeling well.

Addition of Resolution No. 2025-37

This resolution is for a three-year agreement that was reached between the ATU leadership and RTA management team. It will run from August 1, 2024 through July 31, 2027. This contract is for approximately 1,800 RTA employees. The union ratified this agreement on February 18, 2025. The contract includes an 4-3-3 increases over the term of the agreement.

It was moved by Mayor Biasiotta, seconded by Mr. Love and approved to add this resolution to the agenda for further consideration.

Resolution No. 2025-37 - Approving a new three-year Collective Bargaining Agreement Covering conditions of employment with Local 268 of the Amalgamated Transit Union, the adoption of which was moved by Mayor Biasiotta, seconded by Mr. Sleasman and approved by unanimous vote.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This resolution will allow the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a contract for motor vehicle towing and flat tire replacement services for all Authority owned vehicles, as specified and as required, for a period of three years with two, one-year options for renewal.
- DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Authority has a recurring need for towing and flat tire 2.0 replacement services for its fleet of revenue and non-revenue vehicles and, when necessary, the towing of parking violators.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: To enter into a Permanent Easement Agreement ("Easement") with the Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority ("Port") for the construction, use, operation and maintenance of a connector track, delivery switch, and associated facilities to be constructed by the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") on Port property at the Port of Cleveland.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The Authority has a contract with Siemens Mobility, Inc. for the design, manufacture, and delivery of new high floor light railcars which will be used on all the Authority's rail passenger lines. To facilitate the delivery of the new railcars, the Authority intends to construct, operate and maintain new rail track, switches, and associated facilities at the Port of Cleveland to connect rail facilities operated by the Port to the Waterfront Transit Line (the "Project"). From the connection point, the railcars will be moved along the Authority's tracks to the Brookpark Rail Shop for commissioning.

The Port and the Authority intend that the new connector track infrastructure that is constructed for the Project will be a long-term facility. The Easement provides for the terms and conditions of the future operation, maintenance, and use of the new connector track, switch, and associated facilities, including the following:

- An easement across the Port property sufficient in size and dimensions to construct the new connector track, delivery switch and associated facilities at the location shown on Attachment A, Easement Layout.
- The easement is 40 feet wide and encompasses 17,128 square feet or 0.3932 acre.
- The easement will be permanent unless terminated by the parties in accordance with the agreement.
- The easement is non-exclusive; however, the Authority always has priority of use.
- There will be no cost to the Authority for the easement rights granted.

A companion Temporary Construction Easement for additional area for construction and laydown areas, which did not require approval of the Board, was executed on April 19, 2024.

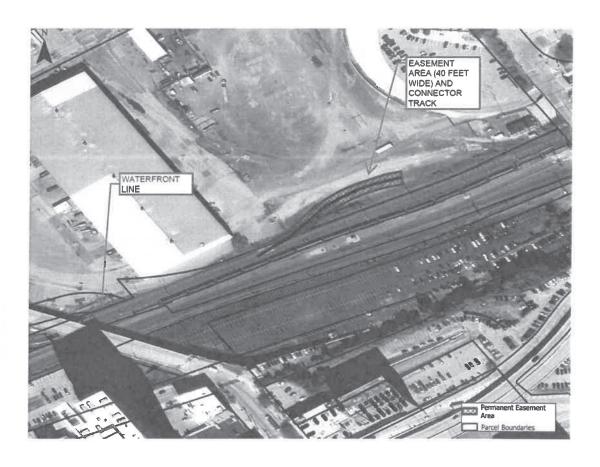

The Authority undertook a Fare Equity Study in 2019 that included extensive public involvement and technical analysis. The major long-term recommendation of this study was to implement fare capping. Fare capping allows customers to enjoy the discounts of unlimited-use passes without paying the full cost of a pass in advance and without incurring losses when their usage of the transit system falls below the break-even level of a pass. To benefit from fare capping, riders must either select the "tap & ride" function in the Authority's fare app or use a smart card.

Open payment allows customers to use contactless payment technologies, including credit cards or smart phones, to pay fares. Open payment mimics single-ride cash fares, prioritizes convenience and does not allow fare capping or discount fares.

In November 2024, the Authority performed a fare equity analysis and determined that the proposed changes will neither create a disparate impact on minority customers nor impose a disproportionate burden on low-income customers. On the contrary, minority customers and low-income customers will be the primary beneficiaries of the proposed fare structure change.

- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Does not apply.

- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: This policy change authorizes fare capping, which makes riding RTA more affordable for many customers. For customers who value convenience more than potential savings, the policy change also authorizes open payments as an option.
- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: Does not apply.
- 7.0 ALTERNATIVES: Not adopting this resolution. Not adopting this resolution will leave the Code Book provision out of line with the current operations of the Authority.

- 8.0 RECOMMENDATION: This resolution was discussed at the February 4, 2025 and March 4, 2025 Committee of the Whole meetings and recommended for consideration by the full Board of Trustees. It is recommended that this resolution be adopted.

Each adult paying the applicable fare may be accompanied by up to three children under six years of age riding free and up to three children aged six through twelve using Child All-Day Passes.

840.07 OPEN PAYMENT POLICY

The General Manager. Chief Executive Officer is authorized to implement open payment, enabling customers to use contactless payment technologies (including credit cards or smart phones) to pay fares. Open payment mimics single-ride cash fares, prioritizes convenience and does not allow fare capping or discount fares.

840.08 TRANSFERS FROM ANOTHER TRANSIT AGENCY.

GCRTA will accept a transfer from the following agencies for a free single ride on GCRTA service as follows:

 - In Medina County, but passengers boarding GCRTA in Medina County must pay the one dollar (\$1.00) out of county surcharge in addition to presenting a transfer.

A customer is not entitled to receive a transfer when paying a cash fare. Customers who need to transfer can do so using passes or farecards. 840.12 EMPLOYER AND GUARANTEED RIDE HOME PROGRAM.

- (b) A "Guaranteed Ride Home Program" will be open to all Authority commuters who purchase their prepaid fare media from their employers through the Authority's employer program and who enroll in the Guaranteed Ride Home Program prior to participation. Participants will be limited to four emergency rides home per year at the actual cost of the ride, up to thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) per ride.
- (c) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to implement administrative procedures that all enrolled participants will be required to follow for scheduling an emergency ride home and submitting reimbursement requests.
- (d) This program may be terminated at the discretion of the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer.

840.13 UNIVERSAL ACCESS PROGRAMS.

- (a) The CEO General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to negotiate and enter into agreements with organizations ("Sponsors") that purchase from the Authority universal access privileges for all members of a clearly defined group. A group includes, but is not limited to:
 - (1) All students at a university, college, school, or school system;
 - (2) All students within a clearly defined subgroup, such as undergraduate students;
 - (3) All students enrolled at a particular educational facility or campus;
 - (4) All employees of an employer;
 - (5) All employees of an employer who work at a particular work site or facility;
 - (6) All employees of multiple employers who work at a clearly defined work site such as an industrial park, airport, or multi-tenant office building;
 - (7) All residents of a new transit-oriented residential development; or
 - (8) All registrants (minimum of 500) at a conference or event scheduled to occur in Cuyahoga County.
- (b) Universal access agreements may be offered to groups where the Authority will benefit from underutilization of the riding privileges. Underutilization means that all members of the group receive access to the Authority's riding privileges but the group members use the riding privilege to varying degrees. Some group members fully utilize the riding privilege, some use it to a limited degree, and some do not use it at all. This underutilization is the sole justification for the discount pricing of Universal Access Programs.
- (c) Pricing. The CEO, General Manager/Secretary Treasurer. Chief Executive Officer or his or her designee will negotiate initial discount levels of any agreement based on reasonably expected levels of underutilization measured by surveying group members or a similar method of estimation. The discount levels for subsequent periods will be based on follow-up measurements or estimates of actual utilization levels by members of the defined group.

840.14 PROOF OF PAYMENT FARE SYSTEM.

- (a) Juvenile Violation Fare.
 - (1) All passengers, including juveniles, are required to have in their possession proof of purchase of a valid, paid fare whenever present in any facilities or vehicles that have been restricted to passengers with a prepurchased fare. Any juvenile found without proof of a valid, paid fare is in violation of this requirement. On the first offense, the juvenile shall be given a warning. On the second and subsequent offenses, the juvenile shall be charged

- a violation fare of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).
- (2) The violation fare shall be paid within thirty days of the mailing of the notice of fare violation by U.S. mail, GCRTA website, or in person at the GCRTA Customer Service Center.
- (3) If the juvenile fails to pay the violation fare within thirty days of the mailing of the notice of the violation, the record may be forwarded to the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office, Juvenile Division, for referral to the county's Community Diversion Program.

(b) Adult Administrative Fee.

- (1) Effective November 1, 2011, adults found to be in violation of the proof of payment fare collection system may pay an administrative fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) within seventy-two business hours and a criminal citation will not be filed. If, however, the administrative fee is not paid within seventy-two business hours, the citation will be referred to the appropriate court for criminal prosecution.
- (2) The twenty-five dollar (\$25.00) administrative fee shall be paid within seventy-two hours to the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority by U.S. mail, GCRTA website, or in person at the GCRTA Customer Service Center.
- (3) Adults who receive a violation citation after November 1, 2011 and, thereafter, receive an additional violation citation within twenty-four months are not eligible for the administrative fee in lieu of the filing of a criminal citation.
- (4) After twenty-four months from a previous violation, adults found to be in violation of the proof of payment fare collection system may pay the twenty-five dollar (\$25.00) administrative fee described in paragraph (b)(1) hereof and a criminal citation will not be filed. (Res. 2011-81. Passed 9-20-11; Res. 2011-82. Passed 9-20-11. Res. 2020-68. Passed 9-1-20.)

840.15 MULTIPLE DAY FARE PASS PROGRAM.

- (a) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to implement a multiple day fare pass program for 1-day, 2-day and 4-day passes, priced consistent with the price of a daily pass.
- (b) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to offer other multiple day passes, provided that these passes are also priced consistent with the price of a daily pass.
- (c) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to offer tiered pricing options as a function of group size for large group purchases of the multiple day passes.

840.16 AUTHORITY TO SUSPEND COLLECTION OF FARES DURING TIMES OF EMERGENCY OR CONSTRUCTION RELATED DETOURS.

- (a) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer shall be and is hereby authorized to suspend the collection of fares for RTA services when an unforeseen occurrence, condition, or event requires that commuters be transported promptly and effectively as a result of the emergency situation or when customers are required to be detoured due to an RTA project.
- (b) During such emergency situation, fares may be suspended system-wide or along such routes as may be affected by the emergency situation.
- (c) The duration of such suspension of fares authorized by this section may continue until such time as the emergency is abated, but not to exceed twenty-four hours, unless the emergency is of such a catastrophic nature that the continued suspension of fares is in the public interest. 840.06 FARE CAPPING POLICY

840.07 OPEN PAYMENT POLICY

Open payment mimics single-ride cash fares, prioritizes convenience and does not allow fare capping or discount fares.

840.09 TRANSFERS.

A customer is not entitled to receive a transfer when paying a cash fare. Customers who need to transfer can do so using passes or farecards. Each trip on a farecard provides a two and one-half hour boarding privilege.

The programs may offer fare incentives or complimentary rides for specific routes, for the entire system and for community sponsored events with a duration of up to sixty days.
- (b) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer shall consider the economic impact to the Authority when offering fare incentives or complimentary rides.
- (c) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer shall report the results of promotional activities to the Board of Trustees on at least an annual basis. (Res. 1993-120. Passed 7-20-93; Res. 2019-67. Passed 6-18-19.)

840.11 RIDE HAPPY OR RIDE FREE PROGRAM.

Under the "Ride Happy or Ride Free Program," the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer may provide customers a free ride in compensation for a service failure. The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to terminate the program if they deem it to be ineffective.

840.12 EMPLOYER AND GUARANTEED RIDE HOME PROGRAM.

- (a) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer may conduct a program to encourage employers to purchase and provide fare media to their employees on a pretax basis.
- (b) A "Guaranteed Ride Home Program" will be open to all Authority commuters who purchase their prepaid fare media from their employers through the Authority's employer program and who enroll in the Guaranteed Ride Home Program prior to participation. Participants will be limited to four emergency rides home per year at the actual cost of the ride, up to thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) per ride.
- (c) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to implement administrative procedures that all enrolled participants will be required to follow for scheduling an emergency ride home and submitting reimbursement requests.
- (d) This program may be terminated at the discretion of the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer. (Res. 2003-020. Passed 2-18-03; Res. 2020-68. Passed 9-1-20.)

840.13 UNIVERSAL ACCESS PROGRAMS.

- (a) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to negotiate and enter into agreements with organizations ("Sponsors") that purchase from the Authority universal access privileges for all members of a clearly defined group. A group includes, but is not limited to:
 - (1) All students at a university, college, school, or school system;
 - (2) All students within a clearly defined subgroup, such as undergraduate students;
 - (3) All students enrolled at a particular educational facility or campus;
 - (4) All employees of an employer;
 - (5) All employees of an employer who work at a particular work site or facility;
 - (6) All employees of multiple employers who work at a clearly defined work site such as an industrial park, airport, or multi-tenant office building;
 - (7) All residents of a new transit-oriented residential development; or
 - (8) All registrants (minimum of 500) at a conference or event scheduled to occur in Cuyahoga County.

- (b) Universal access agreements may be offered to groups where the Authority will benefit from underutilization of the riding privileges. Underutilization means that all members of the group receive access to the Authority's riding privileges but the group members use the riding privilege to varying degrees. Some group members fully utilize the riding privilege, some use it to a limited degree, and some do not use it at all. This underutilization is the sole justification for the discount pricing of Universal Access Programs.
- (c) Pricing. The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer or his or her designee will negotiate initial discount levels of any agreement based on reasonably expected levels of underutilization measured by surveying group members or a similar method of estimation. The discount levels for subsequent periods will be based on follow-up measurements or estimates of actual utilization levels by members of the defined group.

840.14 PROOF OF PAYMENT FARE SYSTEM.

(a) Juvenile Violation Fare.

- (1) All passengers, including juveniles, are required to have in their possession proof of purchase of a valid, paid fare whenever present in any facilities or vehicles that have been restricted to passengers with a prepurchased fare. Any juvenile found without proof of a valid, paid fare is in violation of this requirement. On the first offense, the juvenile shall be given a warning. On the second and subsequent offenses, the juvenile shall be charged a violation fare of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).
- (2) The violation fare shall be paid within thirty days of the mailing of the notice of fare violation by U.S. mail, GCRTA website, or in person at the GCRTA Customer Service Center.
- (3) If the juvenile fails to pay the violation fare within thirty days of the mailing of the notice of the violation, the record may be forwarded to the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office, Juvenile Division, for referral to the county's Community Diversion Program.

(b) Adult Administrative Fee.

- (1) Effective November 1, 2011, adults found to be in violation of the proof of payment fare collection system may pay an administrative fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) within seventy-two business hours and a criminal citation will not be filed. If, however, the administrative fee is not paid within seventy-two business hours, the citation will be referred to the appropriate court for criminal prosecution.
- (2) The twenty-five dollar (\$25.00) administrative fee shall be paid within seventy-two hours to the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority by U.S. mail, GCRTA website, or in person at the GCRTA Customer

- Service Center.
- (3) Adults who receive a violation citation after November 1, 2011 and, thereafter, receive an additional violation citation within twenty-four months are not eligible for the administrative fee in lieu of the filing of a criminal citation.
- (4) After twenty-four months from a previous violation, adults found to be in violation of the proof of payment fare collection system may pay the twenty-five dollar (\$25.00) administrative fee described in paragraph (b)(1) hereof and a criminal citation will not be filed. (Res. 2011-81. Passed 9-20-11; Res. 2011-82. Passed 9-20-11. Res. 2020-68. Passed 9-1-20.)

840.15 MULTIPLE DAY FARE PASS PROGRAM.

- (a) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to implement a multiple day fare pass program for 1-day, 2-day and 4-day passes, priced consistent with the price of a daily pass.
- (b) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to offer other multiple day passes, provided that these passes are also priced consistent with the price of a daily pass.
- (c) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is authorized to offer tiered pricing options as a function of group size for large group purchases of the multiple day passes.

840.16 AUTHORITY TO SUSPEND COLLECTION OF FARES DURING TIMES OF EMERGENCY OR CONSTRUCTION RELATED DETOURS.

- (a) The General Manager, Chief Executive Officer shall be and is hereby authorized to suspend the collection of fares for RTA services when an unforeseen occurrence, condition, or event requires that commuters be transported promptly and effectively as a result of the emergency situation or when customers are required to be detoured due to an RTA project.
- (b) During such emergency situation, fares may be suspended system-wide or along such routes as may be affected by the emergency situation.
- (c) The duration of such suspension of fares authorized by this section may continue until such time as the emergency is abated, but not to exceed twenty-four hours, unless the emergency is of such a catastrophic nature that the continued suspension of fares is in the public interest.

840.17 COMMISSIONS FOR THE SALE OF TICKETS AND PASSES.

(a) The sales commission rates for the Authority's authorized pass outlets are hereby fixed as follows:

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: This resolution authorizes the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to grant a permanent, subsurface easement to The Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company ("CEI") across Authority owned real property for the installation and maintenance of underground electric and communications cables. The purpose of this easement is to allow CEI to relocate existing utility lines that currently cross Authority property.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: Relocation of these utility lines is a small part of the massive, multi-billion-dollar development of the Cuyahoga Riverfront by Bedrock Cleveland. In partnership with the City of Cleveland, Bedrock is developing a 35-acre transit-oriented neighborhood in downtown Cleveland along the banks of the Cuyahoga River.

The utility lines are currently housed within the underside of the Eagle Avenue Bridge, which must be demolished as part of the overall riverfront development. Accordingly, the utility lines must be relocated from the bridge to an underground installation across Authority property.

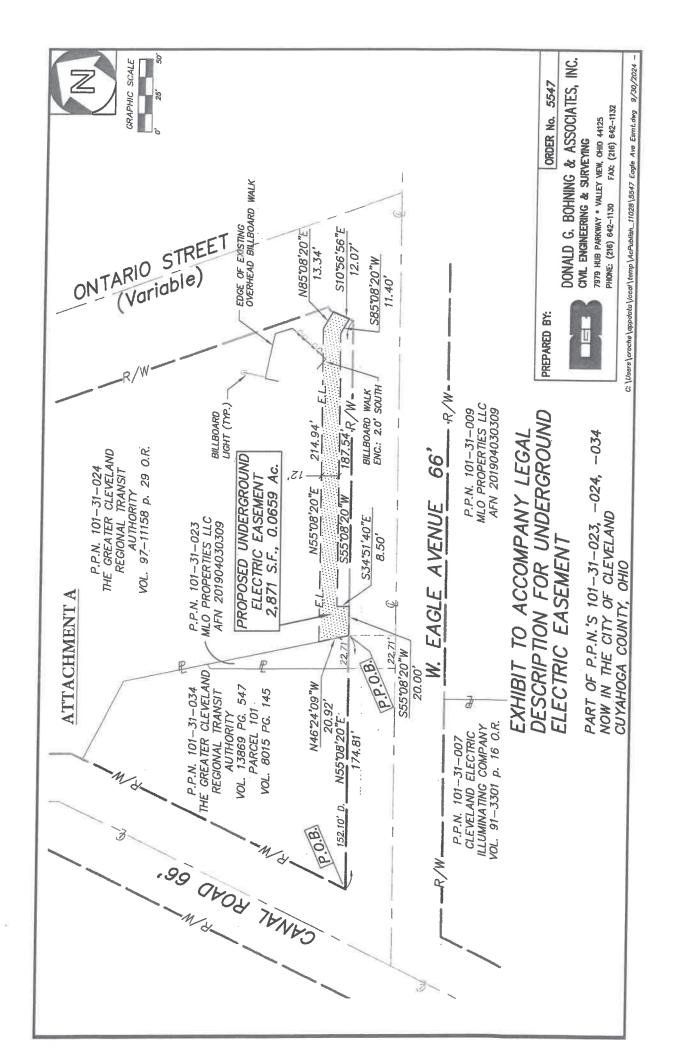

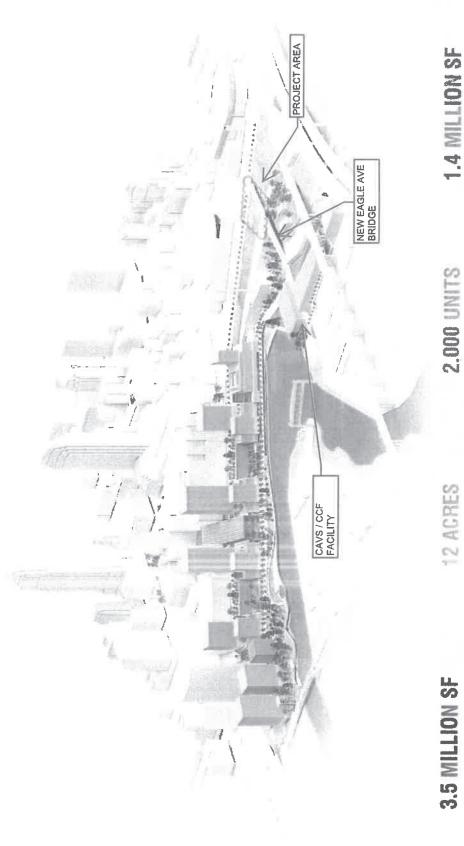

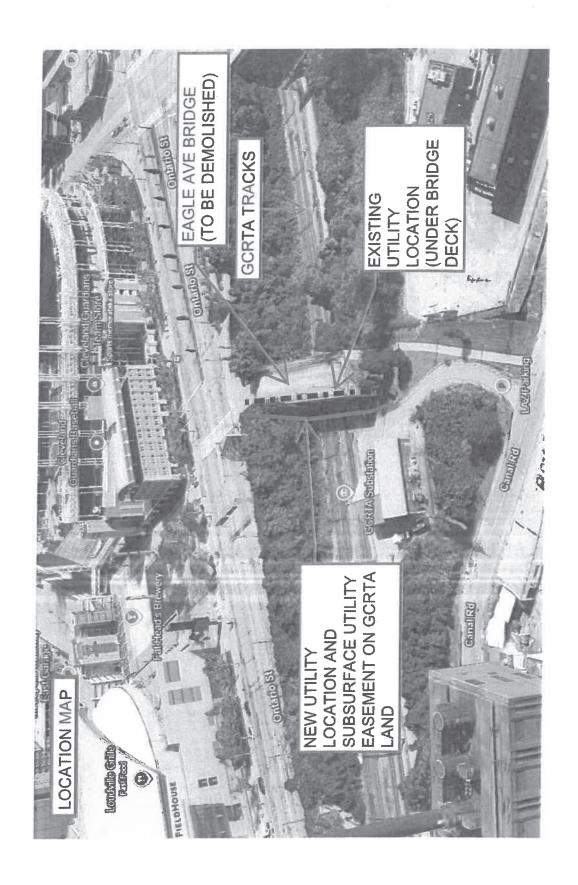

WHEREAS, Bedrock and Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company ("CEI") have requested that the Authority grant CEI a permanent subsurface utility easement across the Property to relocate existing utility lines located on the underside of the Eagle Avenue Bridge adjacent to the Property; and

WHEREAS, the proposed utility easement is consistent with the real estate policies of the Authority.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority, Cuyahoga County, Ohio:

Section 1. That the General Manager, Chief Executive Officer is hereby authorized to execute a permanent Utility Easement Agreement granting CEI an easement of approximately 2,871 square feet for the installation and maintenance of underground electric lines, communication lines and conduit across the Property.

- 1.0 PURPOSE/SCOPE: The resolution seeks approval for the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") to enter into a Purchase and Sale Agreement with Little Italy Development, LLC ("LID") for the proposed purchase of real estate and easement rights that are necessary for the installation, operation and maintenance of a new modular traction power station. The proposed acquisition includes the purchase of approximately 0.1792 acres of land, a permanent access easement, and a temporary work area.
- 2.0 DESCRIPTION/JUSTIFICATION: The current substation is located in a bunker-type facility at the corner of Euclid Avenue and Coltman Road in the City of Cleveland. The substation is old, obsolete and needs replacement. The best location for a new substation is an area on Authority property next to the Red Line tracks and adjacent to the LID property. This configuration requires an access route from Coltman Road (at Euclid Avenue) across property owned by LID. Negotiations with LID resulted in the proposed purchase of a portion of LID's parcel coupled with a permanent access easement from Coltman Road and a temporary work area for use during the construction of the project.

The following is a summary of the pertinent terms of the Purchase and Sale Agreement:

- a. Purchase Price: \$392,000 (\$332,500 for land; \$59,500 for access easement)
- b. \$3,000 earnest money deposit (to escrow)
- c. Purchase price is payable in cash at closing
- d. 45-day due diligence period
- e. Closing within 30 days following the conclusion of the due diligence period

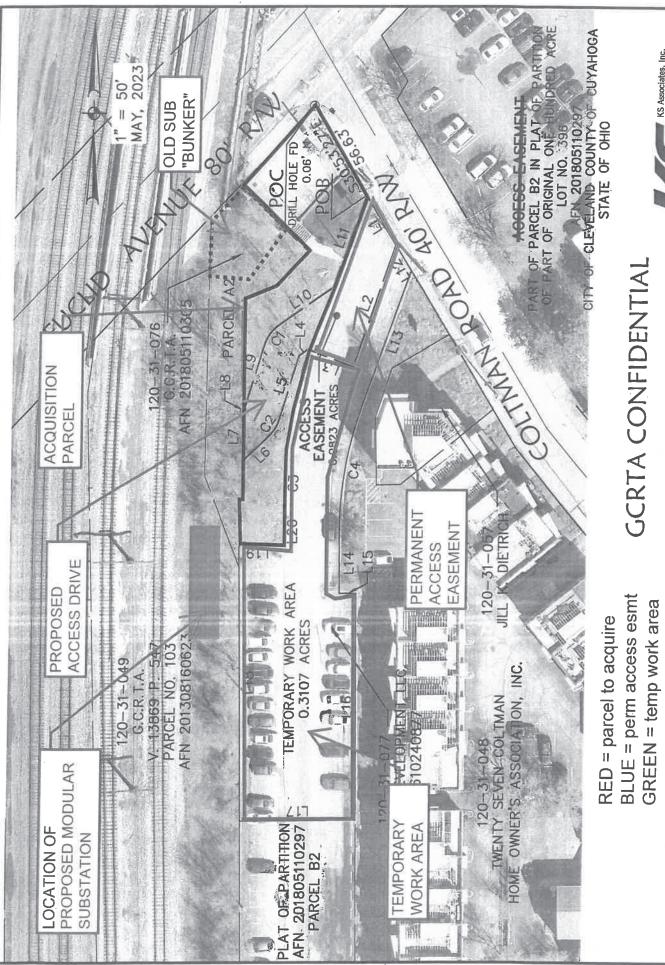
An independent appraisal dated July 26, 2024 was obtained to assist the Authority in establishing a fair market value estimate for the land and interests to be purchased. The 0.1792-acre acquisition parcel was valued at \$312,500 and the 0.0454-acre permanent access easement was valued at \$59,500. The review appraiser concurred on these values in his report dated September 18, 2024. Subsequent negotiations with LID resulted in the total aggregate purchase price of \$392,000 which includes the temporary work area.

- 3.0 PROCUREMENT BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 4.0 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION/DBE BACKGROUND: Does not apply.
- 5.0 POLICY IMPACT: The proposed Purchase and Sale Agreement is consistent with the real estate policies of the Authority.

- 6.0 ECONOMIC IMPACT: This procurement shall be payable through the RTA Development Fund, Engineering & Project Development Department budget, including but not limited to, Capital Grant OH-2023-042-337, in an amount not to exceed \$392,000.00 (\$313,600.00 in federal funds, which represents 80% of total cost).
- 7.0 ALTERNATIVES: Withhold approval of the Purchase and Sale Agreement, in which case the project will not be able to move forward until an alternate site can be found, investigated, designed, and purchased.

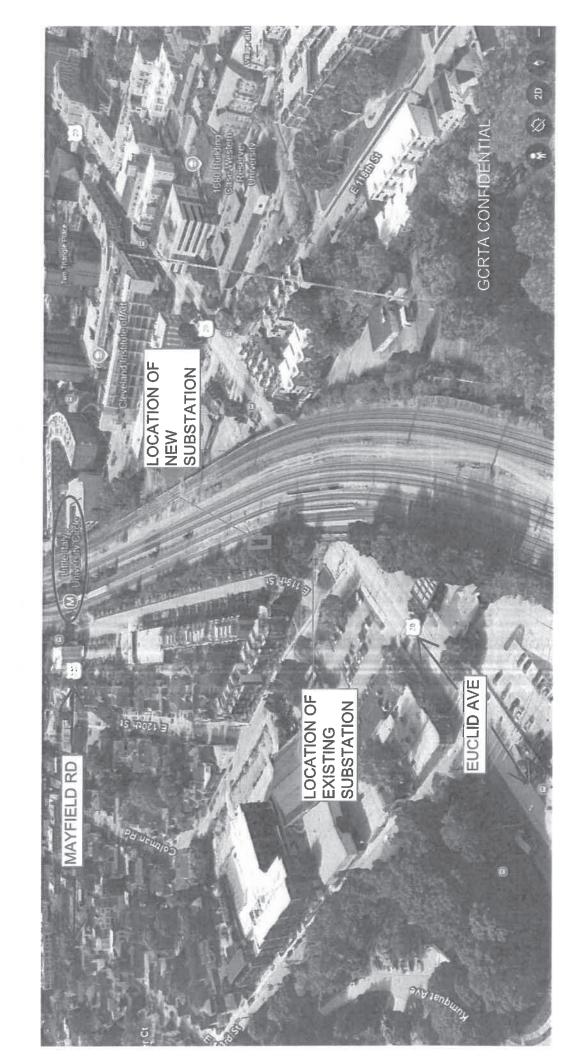

AUTHORIZING THE GREATER CLEVELAND REGIONAL TRANSIT AUTHORITY TO ENTER INTO A PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT FOR THE PURCHASE OF REAL PROPERTY NECESSARY FOR THE INSTALLATION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF A NEW MODULAR TRACTION POWER STATION IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$392,000.00 (RTA DEVELOPMENT FUND, ENGINEERING & PROJECT DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT BUDGET)

WHEREAS, the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority ("Authority") owns and operates an electrical substation, located near the intersection of Euclid Avenue and Coltman Road in the City of Cleveland, which is obsolete and in need of replacement; and

WHEREAS, the Authority intends to construct a new modular traction power station to replace the old substation; and

WHEREAS, the location of the planned replacement substation requires the Authority to acquire adjacent property for the purpose of constructing an access drive to the new site as well as the acquisition of a permanent access easement across adjoining property and a temporary work area for use during construction; and

WHEREAS, the Authority proposes to acquire from Little Italy Development, LLC: (i) a 0.1792 acre parcel of real property, (ii) a permanent access easement, and (iii) space for a temporary work area; and

The month of February began with cash and investment balance of \$363.1 million. Sales tax revenue in the amount of \$21.2 million was received in February. The month closed with a cash and investment balance of \$361.1 million. The Authority's average investment balance for the month was \$369.8 million, compared to \$380.2 million in February 2024.

The Authority's average yield on investments was 4.06% during the month of February.

The average yield on the portfolio year to date is 4.07%, which is 0.09 basis points below the performance standard yield of 4.16% and 0.35 basis points below the money market average yield of 4.43%. The following table summarizes key economic indicators reported in January 2025 /February2025:
